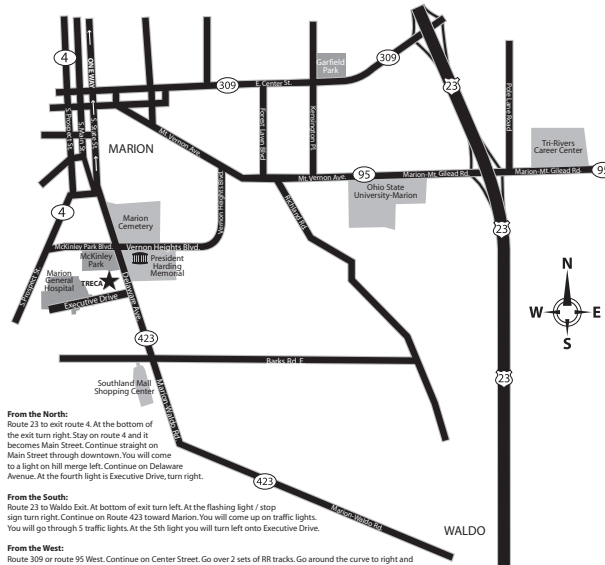
From the President . . .

From the North:
Route 23 to exit route 4. At the bottom of the exit turn right. Stay on route 4 and it becomes Main Street. Continue straight on Main Street through downtown. You will come to a light on a hill merge left. Continue on Delaware Avenue. At the fourth light is Executive Drive, turn right.

From the South:
Route 23 to Waldo Exit. At bottom of exit turn left. At the flashing light / stop sign turn right. Continue on Route 423 toward Marion. You will come up on traffic lights. You will go through 5 traffic lights. At the 5th light you will turn left onto Executive Drive.

From the West:
Route 309 or route 95 West. Continue on Center Street. Go over 2 sets of RR tracks. Go around the curve to right and then around the curve left. Continue on Church Street. Once it becomes a one way get into the right hand lane. At the second light Main Street turn right. You will come to a light on a hill merge left. Continue on Delaware Avenue. At the fourth light is Executive Drive, turn right.

From the East:
Route 309 East. Continue through downtown. Turn left onto Main Street. You will come to a light on a hill merge left. Continue on Delaware Avenue. At the fourth light is Executive Drive, turn right.

From Tri-Rivers Career Center (previous TRECA office)
Route 95 East becomes Mt Vernon Avenue. Continue on Mt Vernon Avenue. You will pass several restaurants, shopping centers and Marion Catholic High School. Once you pass Marion Catholic High School you will turn left on Vernon Heights Blvd. At the light you will turn left onto Delaware Avenue. Get into the right hand lane. At the next light turn right onto Executive Drive.

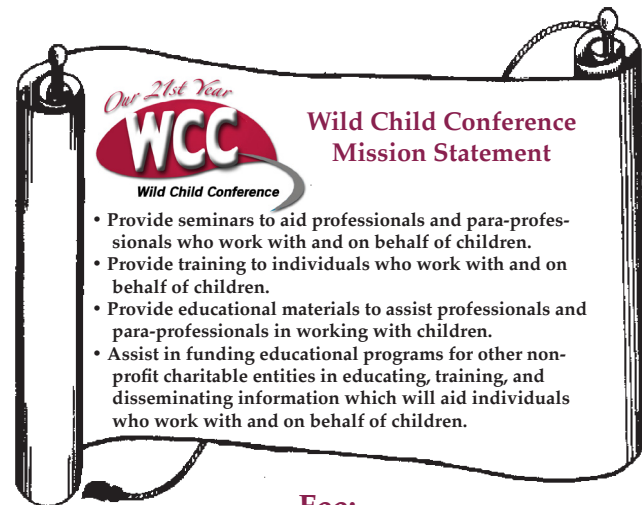

Keynote Address

The Dangers Facing the 21st Century Child: Sexting, Social Networking, and Cyberbullying
 Ohio ICAC Director Frankie Goldberg, Assistant Prosecutor Jesse Canonico, and Investigators McGinnis and Frattare will explain the most common reasons our children engage in the risky, potentially exploitative behaviors of sexting and social networking. The long term consequences to the child by actions such as exploitation, ridicule, and prosecution, demonstrates the need for parents to be educated and proactive.

Speakers

Frankie Goldberg is a graduate of Cleveland-Marshall College of Law and is employed as Assistant Cuyahoga County Prosecuting Attorney, serving in numerous roles including Director of Special Projects and a member of the Cold Case Task Force. She was responsible for the development of the Northern Ohio Elder Protection Training Council, a 40-county training of more than 1,000 federal, state and local law enforcement funded by a grant from the U.S. Department of Justice.

Jesse Canonico is a graduate of The Ohio State University and Cleveland-Marshall College of Law and is employed as Assistant Prosecuting Attorney in the Cuyahoga County Prosecutor's Office. He is a member of the office's Major Trial Unit, which handles all murder, rape, and child victim prosecutions. He is assigned to the Ohio ICAC, which prosecutes all cases of child pornography online as well as online child sexual predators. He has handled more than 60 cases as a first-chair prosecutor.

Rick D. McGinnis began his law enforcement career with the Kenton, Ohio and Ada, Ohio police departments. He formed the Ada P.D.'s Internet Crimes Unit to focus on child exploitation investigations. He authored "To Catch a Creep," published in Law Enforcement Technology magazine. He has since joined the Cuyahoga County Prosecutor's Office as an Investigative police officer and was a member of the FBI's Joint Terrorism Task Force.

David K. Frattare is the lead investigator for the Cuyahoga County Prosecutor's Ohio ICAC Task Force, coordinating and supervising undercover online investigations involving child predators and child pornography. Previously he was employed as a special agent with the Pennsylvania Office of the Attorney General's Bureau of Criminal Investigation. He was assigned to the Child Predator Unit, responsible for more than 60 arrests throughout the United States and Canada involving online sexual exploitation of children.

Breakout Sessions

Robin Palmer earned a Master of Social Service Administration degree from Case Western Reserve University and is licensed by the State of Ohio as an Independent Social Worker-Supervisor. She has specialized training in the assessment and treatment of juveniles and adults engaging in sexual offending behavior. She currently directs The Mokita Center, Inc. which she founded in 1986. The Mokita Center serves clients found delinquent or guilty of sex offenses. Ms. Palmer is also the Executive Director of Play by the Rules, Inc. which is a primary child sexual abuse perpetration prevention program.

Digital Regret: The Dark Side of Technology
 Our technologically savvy teens have entered a legal minefield that we never anticipated. While technology has pushed communication to new levels, it has also made teens more vulnerable to unrealized legal consequences. It has given teens the opportunity to engage in sexting, cyber bullying and the viewing of mobile pornography. This workshop will explore the various digital regrets and the consequences experienced by teens, and discuss possible remedies.

Sheryl M. Rhoades has served as Executive Director of Heart of Ohio Mentoring for the past 10 years. She is co-producer of CyberSafe, a safety program to provide education, victim assistance referrals, and legal education on Internet and media issues.

Major Jeff Cline has been a deputy sheriff at the Marion County Sheriff's Office for 17 years. Major Cline attended Bowling Green State University, graduating with a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice. He has held many positions at the sheriff's

office and currently is in charge of administration. He is also the tactical team commander, training officer, and community law enforcement officer.

A Picture is Worth 1000 words...and Sometimes an Indictment!
 This session provides an overview of how law enforcement and the legal system combat issues involving misuses of the Internet and other technology relevant to families and children. It provides information everyone should know about abuses with current cell phone technology and how to get assistance. Topics include investigative methods, examples of past incidents, current laws, and penalties.

Closing Session

Marcia Kish, after teaching eleven years in elementary classrooms for Worthington City Schools, made a career move to TRECA as a Professional Development Liaison. She currently develops and teaches professional development courses online.

Toss the Dice on Technology to Tame the Wild Child
 Roll the dice to explore ways of using technology to help calm the wild child. In this session, Ms. Kish will take you through multiple technology resources that will help meet the needs of each child. Hands on activities help bring the positive use of technology into any situation, no matter how wild the child.
